- 7 1000 Islands National Park Trails
  Get out and enjoy the many trails throughout the area.
  NOTE: The Jones Creek Trail has two entrances.
  - 8 Lookout & Interpretive Centre
    Part of the 1000 Islands National Park program.

- 9 Mallorytown Landing
  Picnic, enjoy trails, launch a boat or watch ships go by.
- 10 Remembrance Road
  Dedicated to the memory of 19 fallen area servicemen.
- Mallorytown United Church
  Mallorytown's beautiful historic church, welcoming
  to all since 1876.
- St. Paul's Presbyterian Church
  Known for musical programs and community
  outreach, the little country church with a big heart
  was built in 1876, as well.
- Legion
  Royal Canadian Legion Branch 484
- Browns Bay Provincial Day Use Park
  Great beach with swimming and boat launch.
  See the ships go by Singer Castle.
- 15 Waterfront Trail
  Paved 40 km bike path makes for an enjoyable day or overnight trip in the very scenic 1000 Islands.

Our famous Mallory Coach House was built circa 1853 and has been used as a hotel, tavern, doctor's office, farm house and as a residence. More recently it has become a major tourist attraction, art shows, a meeting place for local groups, and a place to showcase historical artifacts and documents.
